## **2022-2023 IMPACT REPORT**

DucksRISE is a career-readiness program for BIPOC, first generation, and/or low-income undergraduates at the University of Oregon. Our program began in early 2022 with a one-year Beyond Completion Challenge grant from the Strada Education Network. We provide wrap-around support, promote well-being & belonging, develop professional competencies, and build community & networks. DucksRISE is open to undergraduate students of all majors and class standing who identify as members of underserved communities; our program helps them find campus resources, opportunities, and each other.

At DucksRISE, we embrace a student-centered mission. The DucksRISE program follows a cohort-based model, which creates space for peer-to-peer mentoring and connections. Extracurricular events like Food, Friends, Fun, Game Night, and the Gala elevate classroom acquaintances to friendships and career and academic collaborations grow into resilient networks.

Members of DucksRISE enroll in UGST 399, a one-credit career readiness seminar that includes discussions of NACE competencies, resumes, cover letters, online brand curation, research methods, interview preparation, graduate school, race, class, gender, intersectionality, and decolonizing predominantly white institutions. We hold tutorials on Study Abroad, Undergraduate Research and Distinguished Scholarships, LinkedIn, Chat GPT, TRIO SSS, UO Libraries, and the Career Center.

After classes conclude, cohorts continue to receive support as they engage experiential learning opportunities. We keep connected through email, social, and Teams; cohort members collaborate on research projects, participate in opportunities to share their stories and platform their voices, and come together for fun activities and mutual support.





